## **Important Connections**

### **Campus Ministry**

Augsburg encourages students to nourish the spiritual dimension of their lives and offers many opportunities and activities, no matter what their religious background. The Augsburg community gathers daily for a 20-minute chapel service open to all where students serve as greeters, readers, senior speakers, musicians and AV tech support. On Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, a community time follows, giving students, faculty, and staff an opportunity for conversation and refreshments. All campus offices close during chapel time—10:20 a.m. on Mon., Wed., Fri., and 11:20 a.m. on Tues. and Thurs. Students can participate in various activities such as service trips, bible studies, Youth Ministry Teams, discussion groups, outreach groups, support groups, retreats, concerts, athletic tournaments, and athletic support groups. All of the initiatives have a commitment to peace, justice, hunger concerns and service to the community.

### **Campus Activities and Orientation (CAO)**

Campus Activities and Orientation (CAO) strives to create innovative programming that fosters individual and community development and that creates an environment where students can connect, engage, and invest in the Augsburg community. CAO is made up of five program areas: Campus Activities, LGBTQIA Services, Student and Group Leadership Development, Orientation Programs, and Student Groups. All of these areas offer students opportunities to find a fit at Augsburg. For more information, contact CAO at 612/330-1418.

### **Residence Life**

Augsburg is committed to giving students the best opportunities for growth both in and out of the classroom. For this reason, Augsburg encourages students to live on campus in one of the five residence halls and to take advantage of activities and leadership opportunities. Each residential community is led by a full-time residence hall director. Depending upon the building and population, there are either resident advisors (RA) or community advisors (CA). They are there to help students enjoy the best possible campus experience. In addition, there are lead student staff members to support the interests of the residential community.

- **Furniture and Supplies**

Each residence hall is unique and furnished to enhance their uniqueness. For more information, please consult the guidebook on the Residence Life web site at <http://www.augsburg.edu/reslife/>. Detailed information regarding furniture, kitchens, and decorating are highlighted. Students are encouraged to bring furniture that they feel is necessary for them. Consult with roommates to coordinate what to bring to your room/apartment. Each student should also bring bedding (size: twin-long) and toiletries. Additional information may be found at the same web site listed above.

- **Housing Contracts**

Students who choose to live on campus are required to sign a housing contract that includes a commitment to living on campus as well as a meal plan. Luther Hall and Oren Gateway provide opportunities for exemption from the College meal plan if the individual is not in their first year of college. Once the document is signed, students are expected to be familiar with and abide by the terms of the housing contract.

- **Breaks/Summer Housing**

First year housing in Urness Hall is closed during winter and spring breaks. Upperclass housing located in Mortensen Hall, Anderson Hall, Luther Hall, and Oren Gateway are open during break periods and students may stay on campus. Summer housing is available to all students whether they are taking classes, working on campus, or working off campus. Please refer to the Residence Life website for contract dates and information.

### **Commuter Student Services**

Augsburg has various resources to help commuter students get settled on campus. Students can rent a free locker for the entire year, get metro bus/light rail schedules, buy discounted bus/rail passes, purchase meal plans for easier access to food on campus, find spaces to relax and study, join a student group, and much more. 1. *Resident Student Board contracts:* These are made for the entire academic year, unless the student graduates or leaves to study abroad. Students may change their meal plan selection only during the first two weeks of each semester. (Students with fewer than seven Augsburg course credits may only choose between a partial or full meal plan.)
2. *Guests:* Guests are welcome to dine in the Commons Cafeteria provided they purchase the meal through the cashier.
3. *Commuter students:* Commuter students can purchase a meal plan to make eating on campus easier.

### **Health Insurance**

Augsburg does not require students to have or show proof of health insurance, with the exception of international students and students who participate in intercollegiate athletics. The College has a contract with UFP-Smiley's Clinic to provide basic health care services to students who do not have health insurance. Students who do not have insurance have a \$5 co-pay at the time of visit. (These services are limited and do not include emergency services of any kind.) Students with insurance would have the co-pay required by their insurance company. When making an appointment, the student should identify himself/herself as an Augsburg student and show a current Augsburg ID at the time of the appointment.

If a student is not covered by a health insurance plan, they may purchase a student health insurance policy from The David Agency by calling Tim Donovan at 952-277-0674 ([www.davidagencyinc.com](http://www.davidagencyinc.com)). ## **Money Matters**

### **Financial Aid Information**

#### **Distribution of Aid**

Before any financial aid is applied to the student's account, the student must submit a complete financial aid application as defined on the financial aid website <http://www.augsburg.edu/studentfinancial/day.html> . The federal, state and institutional financial aid listed on the student's award letter will be applied in equal portions at the beginning of each term. Outside scholarships or grants will be applied to the student's account when they arrive and/or according to donor instructions. No financial aid will be disbursed until the appropriate forms are completed. This means that for the student loans listed on the award letter, you must apply by completing the steps at <http://www.augsburg.edu/studentfinancial/dayloans.html> . If a student has a work-study award on the award letter, a student is eligible to work on campus. Work-study wages are paid directly to the student as he/she works. The amount listed is not guaranteed and the actual amount earned will depend on the hours worked and pay rate. Student employees are paid by check on the 15th of each month for hours worked the previous month.

#### **Renewal of Financial Aid**

Renewal of financial assistance from any and all sources is not automatic. It requires an annual application and is based on maintaining satisfactory academic progress, meeting specific fund requirements, continuing financial eligibility, and availability of funds. All financial aid eligibility is subject to change in federal, state or Augsburg funding regulations or appropriations. Changes in family financial circumstances, enrollment level, program of enrollment, or housing arrangements may also cause adjustments in the award package.

#### **Application Deadline**

The annual priority deadline for returning students to apply for financial aid is **March 1**. Applications received by the deadline will be processed prior to the end of the current academic year. For applications received after May 1, financial aid will be reduced. The student will be reminded of the deadline via his/her Augsburg College email account. #### **Payment Options - Monthly Payment Plan**

Students may pay in monthly installments with payments due on the first day of each month. A non-refundable fee is due at the time of enrollment in this plan. As long as payments are made in a timely manner, no late charges accrue on the unpaid balance. #### **Parent Access**

## **Frequently asked questions**

### **Q: Will we receive a copy of our student's grades?**

A: Parents do not receive copies of grades. The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) stipulates access to academic records is controlled by the student. Grades are officially delivered to students electronically via AugNet Records and Registration. Parents are encouraged to work with their students to remain informed on student academic progress.

### **Q: How does the academic advising program work?**

A: Augsburg uses a team approach to academic advising. The team is made up of the student, faculty advisor(s), and staff advisors. We aim to support students in achieving their academic and vocational goals by guiding them in course, major and minor selection; career and vocation exploration; and policy and process navigation. Generally speaking, we answer questions, give guidance, and make suggestions.

Each student has a faculty advisor within their major or area of study. Faculty advisors are well versed in their discipline and are perfectly suited to guide students with questions, concerns, and issues related to their major. They also answer many questions related to general education requirements. Students in the day program are required to meet with their faculty advisor at least once a term in preparation for course registration. Students in the Weekend and Evening College are strongly encouraged to meet with their faculty advisor, but it is not required. Faculty advisors also sign off on graduation applications. Beyond seeing their faculty advisor for registration, we hope students develop a long-standing, mentoring relationship with their faculty advisor. This is a great opportunity to begin the process of building a professional network within their field.

Augsburg supports the faculty-student advising process with professional staff advisors within many programs across campus. Students access staff advising offices on an as-needed or assigned basis. Students approach us with questions and/or issues. We also reach out to students when situations warrant it. Some offices like Academic Advising, Academic Skills, the Strommen Center for Career and Internship, and the Center for Counseling and Health Promotion are open to all students. Other offices provide advising services to specialized populations. Some of these offices include Athletics, Ethnic Student Support Programs, TRiO/Student Support Services, Undergraduate Research and Graduate Opportunities (URGO), McNair Program, Augsburg Abroad and the office of International Programs, and CLASS & ACCESS. Professional advisors in these offices are excellent resources for policy, procedure, and planning questions. All of these offices team together to support students in achieving their educational endeavors.

### **Q: If my son or daughter experiences difficulty with academic work, whom should s/he contact?**

A: The Academic Skills Office at Augsburg provides students assistance with their academic skills and strategies. Students do not pay extra fees to receive these services. The staff is committed to creating an inviting and comfortable atmosphere for students to discuss and address their academic challenges and goals. Services provided include: note taking, test preparation, reading, communication, skills, time management, supplemental instruction and tutors can be assigned for most courses.

Students are encouraged to work with instructors if they are having difficulties with specific course content and may also be referred to their faculty advisor.

**Q: What is academic probation?**

A: Academic probation policies are designed to alert students that their current level of academic performance is not moving them toward completion of a degree. Academic probation is intended to motivate students to evaluate their options and develop a plan to help them achieve academic success. Students on academic probation are required to meet with an academic advocate at the start of the term. The academic advocates will talk with students about their situation and design a Plan of Assistance to help them improve their academic achievement before allowing them to continue with registration for future terms. Students that are unable to raise their GPA above 2.0, or make any type of academic improvements, may be dismissed from the College. Students dismissed from Augsburg may appear before the Student Standing Committee to appeal their dismissal in order to be reinstated. However, if the dismissal is not overturned, students must take a year off from attending Augsburg. More information is available in the College Catalog on the dismissal process.

**Q: What grade point average (GPA) does my student need to graduate with honors?**

A: The minimum GPA required for Latin honors recognition is 3.60. Other requirements for graduating with Latin honors include completing at least 14 traditionally-graded credits at Augsburg and electing to take no more than two credits with P/N grading.

## **Career Resources**

**Q: How do students obtain on-campus employment?**

A: Augsburg's Human Resources Department posts all positions on Augsburg's website ([www.augsburg.edu/hr](http://www.augsburg.edu/hr)) and students must fill out an on-line application. If a student is eligible for work study, the financial aid award, will indicate that. How much the student earns is based on how much the student works and there is not a guaranteed amount.

**Q: How important is it to do community service and internships while at Augsburg?**

A: In a recent national employer survey, 88 percent of the respondents ranked related work experience as very important when hiring new college grads. One of the best ways for students to enhance their college education, develop valuable skills, and get related work experience is through community service, volunteering, internships, and summer and part-time jobs related to students' majors. Augsburg is known for its experiential education programs allowing students to combine their education with hands-on experience. The Strommen Career and Internship Center lists hundreds of paid and unpaid internships, part-time and summer work opportunities, and the Sabo Center for

Citizenship and Learning actively develops community service-learning opportunities for students through their college courses, the Bonner Leaders Program, the Campus Kitchen Program, tutoring, and volunteer work in neighborhood organizations and schools.

**Q: What career planning and job search assistance is available for students?**

A: The Strommen Career and Internship Center provides professional career counseling and assessments to help students identify their career goals, personal interests, skills and sense of vocation in the world. The center also provides programs and services to assist students with choosing majors, career research, networking with alumni and friends of the College, job search strategies, résumé writing and interviewing, and exploring graduate school. The center posts volunteer, internship and career opportunities on a web-based posting system call AugPost, invites employers to campus, and is actively involved each year in providing various career explorations events, career fairs and the Minnesota Private College Job and Internship Fair and the MN Education Career Fair. **Q: Are there opportunities for my son or daughter to participate in an off campus/study abroad program?**

A: Yes! All Augsburg students are encouraged to make international and off-campus study a part of their educational experience. These experiences can fulfill graduation requirements and the Augsburg Experience requirement. In addition to academic knowledge about their discipline and a particular country/region of the world, students gain a greater sense of self, their place in the world, and personal leadership skills that help them to succeed in the future.

The Augsburg Abroad office (in 200 Murphy Place, 612-330-1650) provides study abroad support through academic, financial, and personal study abroad advising as well as orientation and re-entry programming for students. A study abroad resource library is available to help students plan an international learning experience.

Augsburg offers over 300 programs in nearly 90 different countries worldwide. This includes its own quality programs through the Center for Global Education (CGE), the Higher Education Consortium for Urban Affairs (HECUA), and the International Partners and Exchange Programs (IPE). Students may choose to study abroad for a summer, semester or a year; they can take advantage of Augsburg faculty-led short-term programs abroad, usually 2-5 weeks in length, in January or in the summer. The cost for many study abroad programs is comparable to studying on campus; any financial aid will transfer and additional scholarships are available.

## **Telephones, Computers, and Technology**

The TechDesk is Augsburg's central point of contact for all student technology questions. TechDesk staff are always happy to help, and can be reached via phone at 612-330-1400, via email at [techdesk@augsborg.edu](mailto:techdesk@augsborg.edu), chat <http://support.augsburg.edu/support> or online at <http://www.augsburg.edu/techdesk>. Please contact the TechDesk if you have any questions that are not answered here!

**Q: What telephone services are available to my student?**

A: The College provides one active phone line per residential space as part of the room cost. In most residence halls, students must provide their own telephone to connect to the phone line. Voicemail and call-waiting services are available at a nominal cost to all resident students. Students may sign up for these services online at <http://www.augsburg.edu/techdesk> (search for "Telephones"). Because most students use a cell phone or have a calling card, long distance service is not provided through the residence hall room phone line.

**Q: Does the College provide Internet access?**

A: Yes, all of Augsburg's residence halls are provided with both wired (Ethernet) and wireless Internet access, allowing any resident student with a properly equipped computer to access the Internet from his/her room. Students will need their AugNet username and password in order to access the Internet from the residence halls. For assistance, students should contact the TechDesk.

**Q: Are there computers available for use on campus?**

A: In addition to computer-equipped classrooms, Augsburg maintains a 24-hour computer lab in the lobby of the Urness/Mortensen residence halls and provides laptops for checkout and use in Lindell Library. There are also web kiosks in the ChristensenCenter. Some departments also maintain smaller computer labs for specialized use. In total there are more than 250 computers available to students on the Augsburg campus.

**Q: Does the College recommend a certain type of computer?**

A: Augsburg supports both Macintosh and Windows computers.

**Q: Will my student have access to e-mail?**

A: Yes, every student is automatically assigned an e-mail account which students can activate online at <http://www.augsburg.edu/techdesk> under the link labeled "Activate my Account". E-mail is accessible anywhere, on- or off-campus, through a web browser. Accounts remain active throughout a student's Augsburg career.

**Q: Are there any software discounts available to my student?**

**Q: What does the Augsburg Department of Public Safety provide for its students?**

A: Augsburg is an urban campus and is committed to maintaining high standards for safety and security in the residence halls. Security is of utmost concern to staff, and is a shared responsibility between students and the College. In order to enhance the security of the residence halls, all exterior doors are kept locked 24 hours a day, and both students and staff security monitor the exterior and interior of the halls. While these actions are part of safety, each resident shares responsibility for maintaining a safe and secure environment. For all emergencies on campus, dial 612-330-1717. The Augsburg Security 24-hour service desk is located in the Urness/Mortensen Hall lobby.

**Q: What is Augsburg’s policy about alcohol and other drugs? How is it enforced?**

A: The alcohol policy states in part, “Augsburg College does not condemn nor condone the use of alcoholic beverages.” Augsburg is committed to the prevention of alcohol abuse and the illegal use of alcohol and other drugs. The College prohibits the unlawful possession, use, manufacture, or distribution of alcohol or other drugs by students, faculty, staff, and guests on the College campus or at College-related programs or activities. Other drugs prohibited by this policy include, but are not limited to, marijuana, cocaine, cocaine derivatives, heroin, amphetamines, barbiturates, hallucinogens, tranquilizers, and inhalants. Students residing in College housing who have reached legal drinking age have the right to make their own decisions regarding possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages in their residences. In case any student or group is accused of violating the alcohol policy [the student or group] will be reviewed by the dean of students or designee, and (if necessary), sanctions will be determined according to the College’s Disciplinary Policy and Procedures <[www.augsburg.edu/studentguide/](http://www.augsburg.edu/studentguide/)>.

Celebrating the life of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Augsburg’s Pan-Afrikan Center takes primary responsibility for this celebration. This annual event is held on the national holiday designated for Dr. King, and celebrates the start of the spring semester for the day program.

### **Late Night Breakfast**

Late Night Breakfast is an annual event sponsored by Student Affairs and A’Viands Food Service to encourage students to take a nutritious study break from final exams, usually the Monday of finals week each semester.

### **Peace Prize Forum**

In cooperation with the Norwegian Nobel Institute, five Midwestern colleges of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America sponsor the annual Nobel Peace Prize Forum. The colleges, all founded by Norwegian immigrants, sponsor the forum to give recognition to Norway’s international peace efforts and to offer opportunities for Nobel Peace Prize laureates, diplomats, scholars, and the general public to share in dialogue on the dynamics of peacemaking and the underlying causes of conflict and war.
